Minutes of the 21st meeting (Part-II) of the Central Monitoring Committee held on 09.04.2026 regarding 351 polluted river stretches based on the directions of Hon'ble NGT in the matter OA No. 673 of 2018

The 21st meeting (Part-II) of the Central Monitoring Committee (CMC) constituted by Hon'ble NGT in the matter OA No. 673 of 2018 was held at Conference Room, DoWR, RD&GR, MoJS in hybrid mode with 18 States/ UTs on 09.04.2026 under the Chairmanship of Secretary, DoWR, RD & GR, Ministry of Jal Shakti (MoJS). The list of participants is at ***Annexure-I***.

Secretary, DoWR, RD & GR, MoJS welcomed all the participants. It was informed that 4 States – Assam, Gujarat, Kerala and Puducherry have requested to be taken up for discussion on another date for reasons communicated by them.

Joint Secretary, NRCD highlighted the mandates of CMC in the light of Hon'ble NGT order in December, 2019. He further told that as per the latest polluted river stretches assessment report of CPCB dated October 2025, 296 polluted river stretches/locations have been identified on 271 rivers in 32 States/UTs, based on the water quality data for the years 2022 and 2023. The number of polluted river stretches has come down from 351 stretches identified in 2018 and 311 stretches identified in 2022.

State/UT-wise Review & Directions

1. Karnataka

- 1.1 The number of polluted river stretches came down from 17 in 2022 to 14 in 2025, with deletion of 5 river stretches and addition of 2 new river stretches. The stretches of River Arkavathi and Dakshinpinakini, remain in Priority-I. River Thenpennai which was previously in Priority-I have been delisted. Deterioration is observed in water quality of River Tungabhadra, which now falls in Priority-I. State to prepare Action Plan for restoration of River Tungabhadra on priority.

[Action: State of Karnataka]

- 1.2 State to expedite the on-going STP projects having minimal incremental progress in last 6 months and to bridge the gap in sewage treatment capacity.

[Action: State of Karnataka]

- 1.3 Principal Secretary (Environment), Karnataka informed that there are now 108 STPs under construction and utilization capacity of the existing STPs increased from 63% to 77%. Updated status with regard to the sewage treatment

management and the on-going STP progress shall be submitted shortly to the Ministry.

- 1.4 The Chair directed the State to formulate and adopt policy for reuse of treated wastewater. **He further directed that the Action Plan proposed for the year 2026-27 for restoration of Polluted River Stretches be submitted by the end of this month for discussion in the next CMC meeting.**

[Action: State of Karnataka]

2. Tamil Nadu

- 2.1 The number of polluted river stretches came down from 10 in 2022 to 9 in 2025, with deletion of 2 river stretches and addition of 1 new river stretch. The stretches of River Thirumanimuthar, Vasista, Adyar and Cooum remain in Priority-I. Deterioration is observed in water quality of River Sarabanga, which now falls in Priority-I. State to focus on these river stretches on priority basis.

[Action: State of Tamil Nadu]

- 2.2.1 Principal Secretary (Municipal Administration & Water Supply), Tamil Nadu informed that STPs are in advance stages of completion in Salem in the catchment of River Sarabanga. STPs and MSW facilities are being improved in the catchment of River Thirumanimuthar and Vasista. Major project for restoration of river Adyar is being taken up and shall commence by May/ June 2026.
- 2.2.2 For enhancing the utilization capacity of the existing STPs, more house sewer connections are being taken up and a consultant was engaged to conduct study for improving the existing STPs in the State. Policy for Reuse of Treated Wastewater was notified by the State in 2019.
- 2.2.3 Further, it was informed that floodplain modelling was done for 9 rivers and floodplain zoning and mapping works are under process and shall be completed within a year.
- 2.2.4 The Coastal Action Plan has been prepared by NCCR, Chennai and shall be presented before ACS (Environment), Tamil Nadu and the final Plan will be submitted to GoI for approval.

3. Manipur

- 3.1 The number of polluted river stretches increased from 13 in 2022 to 18 in 2025. All the identified river stretches are in Priority-V. State to identify the causes and take measures for restoration of the river stretches.

[Action: State of Manipur]

- 3.2.1 Principal Secretary (Environment), Manipur informed that for restoration of the newly added polluted river stretches, States proposes treatment through phytoremediation.
- 3.2.2 The ongoing STP of 49 MLD shall be completed by December, 2027. Under SBM 2.0, 9 STPs of 22.2 MLD in different ULBs are approved. 5 FSTPs of 225 KLD shall be completed by 30th December 2026. 9 FSTPs of 50 KLD in 9 ULB shall be completed by March 2027. 4 CETPs of 400 KLD each shall be made operational soon.
- 3.2.3 Work is under progress for utilization of the treated wastewater in agriculture and for plantation along the rivers. However, no policy for reuse of treated wastewater exists.
- 3.2.4 Demarcation of prohibited zones along the major rivers have been done however floodplain zoning works are yet to be taken up. State was advised to carry out Floodplain Zoning study as per Technical Guideline issued by CWC in July, 2025.
- 3.3 State to identify Model River and convene regular meetings of River Rejuvenation Committee. Further, State may adopt policy for Reuse of Treated Wastewater.

[Action: State of Manipur]

4. Himachal Pradesh

- 4.1.1 The number of river stretches increased from 9 in 2022 to 10 in 2025. With delisting of 3 river stretches and addition of 4 river stretches. Deterioration in water quality observed in stretches of River Beas, Giri, Markanda and Ratta, with the latter two now categorized in Priority-I.
- 4.1.2 Chair directed State to urgently take up the matter with Chief Secretary, HP for taking immediate action for revival of the rivers considering the pristine nature of the rivers in hilly regions and the tourism aspect.

[Action: State of Himachal Pradesh]

- 4.1.3 State to expedite the works of ongoing and under tendering STP projects. State to ensure compliance of the 21 STPs reported to be non-compliant. State to formulate and adopt policy for reuse of treated wastewater.

[Action: State of Himachal Pradesh]

- 4.2 Secretary (Jal Shakti Vibhag), Himachal Pradesh informed that the issue of pollution in rivers shall be taken up on priority. Appropriate action will be taken for ensuring compliance of the existing STPs. Stagnant progress in few of the ongoing STP projects were due to FCA clearances, which is being continuously monitored. The proposed CETP at Paonta Sahib was in planning stage and

approved from Department of Pharmaceutical, Gol, however funding for the same was not received. The industries in the catchment are complying with the norms. The details of reutilization of treated waste water shall be provided shortly to the Ministry.

5. Tripura

- 5.1 The stretch of river Haora remains in Priority V. State to closely monitor the progress of ongoing STP works for bridging the gap in sewage treatment.

[Action: State of Tripura]

- 5.2 Principal Secretary (Environment), Tripura informed that sewage treatment capacity of 17.4 MLD exists in the State and STPs of 71 MLD are under-construction having completion timeline of May 2026 and May 2027. In 20 ULBs, solid waste processing facilities of 446 TPD exists. State has policy for Reuse of Treated Wastewater and the copy of notification shall be shared with the Ministry.

[Action: State of Tripura]

6. Telangana

- 6.1 The number of polluted river stretches came down from 9 in 2022 to 5 in 2025. With deterioration in water quality reported in stretches of River Krishna and Manjeera, both are now in Priority-III.

[Action: State of Telangana]

- 6.2.1 Principal Secretary (Environment), Telangana informed that maximum BOD value observed in River Krishna was 3.2 mg/l in 2023 and hence CPCB was requested to reconsider the same and classify River Krishna in Priority-III. CPCB may respond to their request appropriately.

[Action: CPCB]

- 6.2.2 Further, it was informed that gap in utilization capacity of the existing STPs can be attributed to the fact that STPs were planned for 15 years. Hence, the capacity utilization shall improve in due course. Further, work of 1142 MLD STPs have commenced and shall be completed by December, 2027. With regard to solid waste management, it was informed that work is in progress in 141 ULBs for installation of 2961 TPD of MSW facilities.

- 6.2.3 MD, HMWSSB informed that in last two years, 19 STPs of 1166 MLD completed and 1 STP of 140 MLD shall be completed by May 2026. This has resulted in improvement in quality of River Musi. Further, 39 STPs have been sanctioned

under AMRUT and 7 STPs are in Musi catchment. The delay in implementation of 16 STPs having LoA issued on 07.03.2024 was due to land allotment issues and the same is being pursued by the State.

- 6.2.4 Chair remarked that large number of STPs are coming up in the State, therefore State may formulate and notify policy for reuse of treated waste water.

[Action: State of Telangana]

7. Meghalaya

- 7.1 The number of polluted river stretches came down from 7 in 2022 to 2 in 2025. Stretches of River Umkhrah and Umshyrpi still remain in Priority-I.
- 7.2 Principal Secretary (Environment), Meghalaya informed that construction of large STPs in hilly terrains is a challenge, however FSTP and STP projects have been taken up and are in various stage of construction for bridging the gap in sewage treatment. Similarly, setting up of MSW facilities is in progress for bridging the gap in solid waste management.
- 7.3 Chair directed State to submit in written Action Plan for the year 2026-27 for the activities proposed to be taken for restoration of the river stretches. State to also formulate and notify policy for reuse of treated waste water.

[Action: State of Meghalaya]

8. Andhra Pradesh

- 8.1 The number of polluted river stretches increased from 3 in 2022 to 4 in 2025. Deterioration in water quality observed in stretch of River Gostani and now is in Priority-III.
- 8.2 Principal Secretary (Environment), Andhra Pradesh informed that the STPs in Rajahmundry shall be put on trial by August 2026. STP works proposed to be taken up in Narasapuram are held up due to land issues. Work order issued for 345 STPs and shall be completed by this year. The 9 STPs having no incremental physical progress in last 6-7 months have been retendered and shall be completed by March, 2027. Construction of 101 solid waste processing facilities of 3500 TPD are in progress. Integrated Solid Waste Management (ISWM) facilities shall be completed within 6 months and Waste to Energy (WtE) plants within 2 years. Floodplain zoning of rivers is under legislation and shall take 2-3 months. Policy with regard to reuse of treated waste water to be put for approval of Cabinet. The Action plan for coastal pollution management was circulated with various stakeholders and the final plan shall be submitted soon.

- 8.3 Chair directed State to submit in written Action Plan for the year 2026-27 for the activities proposed to be taken for restoration of the river stretches. State to also formulate and notify policy for reuse of treated waste water.

[Action: State of Andhra Pradesh]

9. Goa

- 9.1 The number of polluted river stretches came down from 6 in 2022 to 2 in 2025. Deterioration reported in river Sal, which now is in Priority-II.
- 9.2 Secretary (Environment), Goa informed that source study has been done for river Sal and bio-remediation was taken up on pilot basis and BOD of 4 mg/l was observed. A meeting was held under the Chairmanship of Minister, WRD and Rs.21 crores proposed for tackling the issue. Further, 2 ongoing STPs shall be completed within this year. Further, the proposed solid waste facilities shall be completed within 2 years. State shall work on coming out with reuse of treated waste water policy.
- 9.3 Chair remarked that considering the number of tourists visiting the State, exemplary work needs to be done with regard to management of solid & liquid waste, reuse of treated water, floodplain zoning etc.

[Action: State of Goa]

10. Mizoram

- 10.1 The number of polluted river stretches increased from 3 in 2022 to 4 in 2025. With deterioration in water quality reported in stretches of river Chite (Priority-II), Tuikual (Priority-II) and Lawibual (Priority-III).
- 10.2 Secretary (Irrigation & Water Resources Department), Mizoram informed that for restoration of the rivers, awareness campaigns and pilot projects at few locations are being undertaken. There exists a 10 MLD STP at Aizawl. A 3.5 MLD STP is in progress and revised timeline shall be submitted. For bridging the gap in sewage treatment, DPRs are under preparation. Updated status with regard to solid waste management in the State shall be submitted. Due to topographical limitation, reutilization of treated waste water is a challenge. The floodplain zoning bill is under law department and is expected to be finalized soon.
- 10.3 Chair directed State to submit in written Action Plan for the year 2026-27 for the activities proposed to be taken for restoration of the river stretches.

[Action: State of Mizoram]

11. Sikkim

- 11.1 The number of polluted river stretches increased from NIL in 2022 to 3 in 2025.
- 11.2 Secretary (PHED), Sikkim informed that the reason for deterioration in water quality in river is due to increase in number of residential spaces in Gangtok owing to increased tourist activities. For addressing the issue of pollution, sewer network and STPs are proposed to be taken up in Gangtok.
- 11.3.1 Member Secretary, Sikkim Pollution Control Board informed that due to typographical error from the State's end while filling-up of the BOD values in the EWQDES portal under the NWMP, the river stretches have been categorized wrongly as Priority-II and IV river stretches in CPCB's Report. The issue along with the actual copy of water quality analysis report was communicated to CPCB for correction in the report, however no action has been taken.
- 11.3.2 Chair directed CPCB to look into the matter and to provide appropriate response to the State's submission.

[Action: CPCB]

12. Nagaland

- 12.1 The number of polluted river stretches came down from 4 in 2022 to 2 in 2025. With improvement reported in stretch of River Dhansiri.
- 12.2 Member Secretary, Nagaland Pollution Control Board informed that updated status shall be submitted.
- 12.3. Chair emphasized that State be represented by Secretary level officer in the meetings of CMC so that comprehensive and holistic view on the actions being taken up in the State can be discussed. A letter be written to Chief Secretary, Nagaland for ensuring participation of senior level officials in the meetings.

[Action: NRCD]

13. Maharashtra

- 13.1 Chair directed State to focus on the issues raised in the presentation. Further, State to make a presentation on the works being carried out by the State in implementation of the Reuse of the Treated Wastewater Policy.

[Action: State of Maharashtra]

14. Daman, Diu, Dadra Nagar Haveli

- 14.1 Deterioration reported in the stretch of river Damanganga, which is now Priority-II.

- 14.2 Member Secretary, DDDNH Pollution Control Committee informed that as per the monitoring reports, BOD of less than 10 mg/l have been observed in the river. After verification, the issue shall be communicated to CPCB for reconciling the data.
- 14.3 Chair remarked that CPCB's latest Report on Polluted River Stretches was published in October 2025 and after lapse of 6 months, the UT is raising the request for reconciliation of the data. A letter be written to Administrator, DDDNH for highlighting the issue and for ensuring participation of senior level officials in the meetings.

[Action: NRCD]

15. Miscellaneous

- 15.1 Concluding the meeting, Chair directed all the States/UTs to provide action plan with regard to the issues highlighted in the CMC meeting and details of the activities proposed to be taken for restoration of the river stretches in the year 2026-27. NMCG/NRCD to follow up with the States/UTs and get Action Plan by end of this month and to regularly monitoring the progress.**

[Action: All States/UTs, NRCD, NMCG]

- 15.2 CPCB to look into the requests raised by the States/UTs with regard to rectification in the October 2025 Polluted River Stretches report.**

[Action: CPCB]

- 15.3 NMCG/NRCD to organize a webinar, wherein the 4 States namely Maharashtra, Rajasthan, Uttarakhand and Uttar Pradesh can present the status of implementation of the Policy adopted by these States on Reuse Treated Waste water, so that the learnings can be replicated by other States/UTs.**

[Action: NRCD, NMCG]
